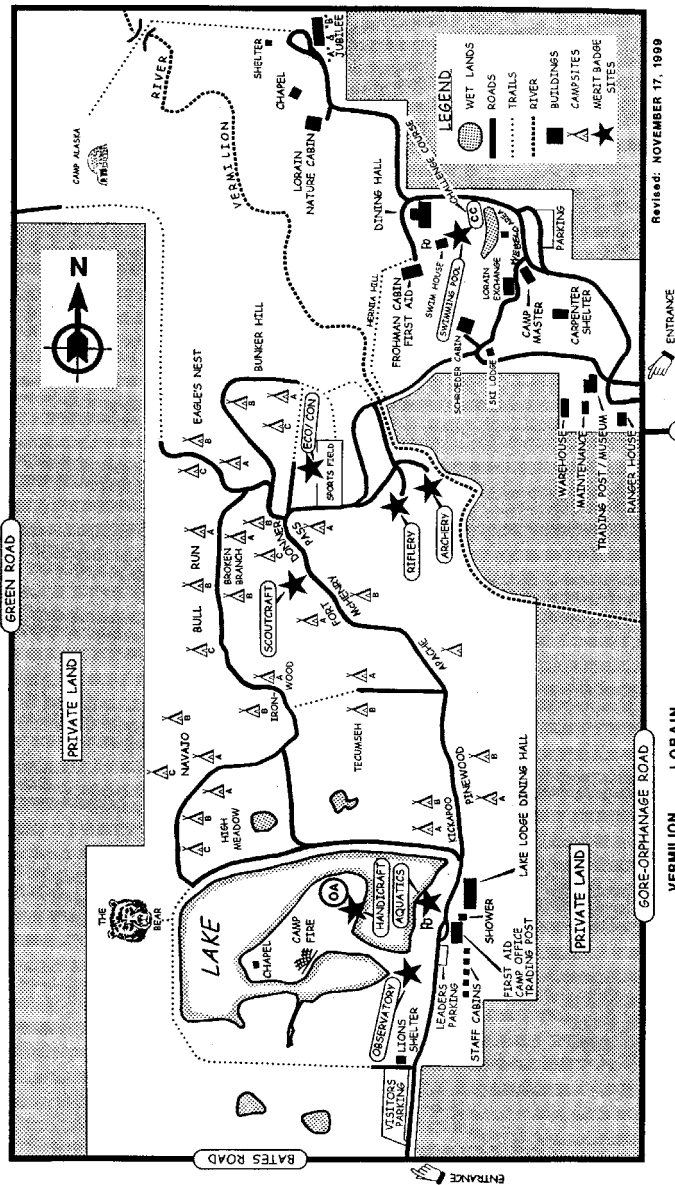

- 2 Med. Eggs
- 1 Tbl Onion, Chopped
- 1 Tbl Bacon Bits
- 1 Tbl Mild Salsa
- 2 Tbl Water
- 1 Quart Freezer Zip Lock Bag

- 2 Fluor Tortillas
- 2 Slices Cheese - American or Other
- To taste Salt and Pepper

1. Break eggs carefully into freezer bag.
2. Add bacon bits, salsa, onion and water.
3. Carefully zip bag tightly, removing as much air as possible and mix with finger pressure to scramble eggs in the bag.
4. Place bag and contents into boiling water and cook until done.
5. Remove from heat and spoon into tortillas, add cheese to top, season to taste with salt and pepper.

If there are no leaks from the bag the boiling water can be used for hot chocolate for other hot breakfast beverage.

## Whistle Tag

The MacScouter's Big Book of Games

Type: Outdoor, night game.

Equipment: One whistle for each hunted leader and one pad and pencil for each hunting team

Set-Up: Four to five acres of woodland is best for the play area. Divide the group into Patrols of 6 to 8. Patrols must stay together for the entire game. Leaders are given a two minute head start into the playing area.

Play: After the two minute head start, each hunted-leader must blow his whistle once each minute.

Each Patrol begins to hunt the leaders. The Patrols try to capture as many leaders as possible by touching them and writing down their name. Caught leaders are allowed to escape as soon as they are touched and another leader must be caught before catching the leader again.

Scoring: When a member of the Patrol touches a hunted-Leader, the Patrol scores one point. The Patrol with the most points wins.

Variation: Use flashlights instead of whistles for a quieter and more difficult night game.

## The New Scout Builds an Equity in His Troop

Scout Leaders in Action,

When a boy becomes a Scout, his enthusiasm at joining is high. The Troop's natural momentum and its colorful program of activities are usually compelling enough to assure devoted participation for some time on his part and on the part of his parents. Then after several months there often comes a crucial period. "His interest begins to lag.", we say. His Patrol and Troop procedures may sometimes seem less colorful to him than they did at first. The Scout may begin to miss an occasional meeting.

What is the remedy? We need to do everything possible from his first day as a Scout to make sure this new boy in the Troop begins to *build up his equity in Scouting.*

The man who owns a house is going to be more proud of it and more devoted to improving it than the man who merely rents it. Small equity or large, a man is more inclined to value, take care of and feel satisfaction in the possession of that house. The Scout in the Troop in a similar way can build up his equity in Scouting.

A boy can build several kinds of equities in his Scout Troop, one of which is equity in rank. If he becomes a First Class Scout, he has more to lose by dropping out than if he is only a Tenderfoot. If he has three merit badges, he is more likely to stay than if he has none. His experience in his Patrol and Troop can help him make friends and feel so strong a sense of fellowship in his Scouting relationships that he naturally keeps them growing. There are equities in leadership, in the sense of satisfaction in learning and understanding about Scouting. The deeper these roots go, the higher his interest will reach.

We need to help each boy, new and old, to ever continue to build up his equities in Scouting, that way we will all reap the dividends.
