| 1 | Cup | Frozen Hash Brown Potatoes |

| 2 | 12 X 12" | Square Aluminum Foil |

1. Place sausage patty on the center of the aluminum foil square.
2. Place handful (~1 C) of the hash browns on top with a depression in the middle.
3. Break the egg into the depression and season.
4. Wrap with a drugstore wrap. Wrap with a separate second square of aluminum foil square.
5. Bake over coals for 10 to 15 minutes with the sausage patty on the bottom. Do not turn.
6. Can be eaten in the foil wrapping.

Serves - 1

Equipment: None needed

Set - up: Players are paired and the pairs form a circle with the game leader in the middle. The pairs sit in the circle with one on the inside and one on the outside. No player can stand up once the game starts except the game leader.

Play: The leader selects one or more pairs of players. The player on the inside tries to escape to the middle while his partner on the outside tries to prevent him from doing so. The first player to reach the leader takes the leader's place.

The old leader takes the place vacated by the new leader. The new leader now mixes up the pairs by giving one of the following directions.

1. Switching front to back. Inside players become outside and vice versa.
2. Inside right or left shift a number of places. The outside players stay in place and the inside players move right or left by the number of spaces given, thereby forming new pairs.
3. Outside right or left shift a number of places. Same as above.

The game then continues by pointing to one or more pairs as above.

Scoring: No scoring kept. Game is for fun only.

Options: None given. Use your imagination.

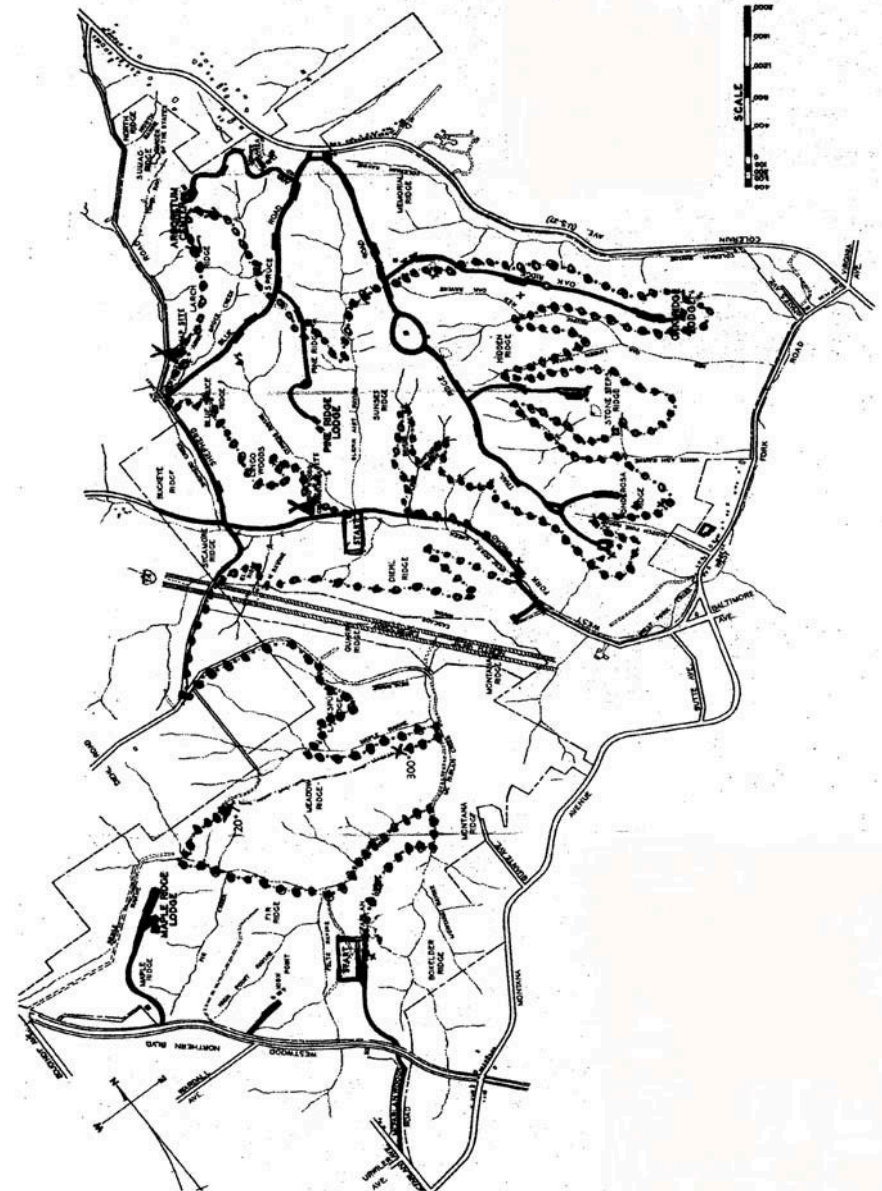

Friends and memories that always will stay.

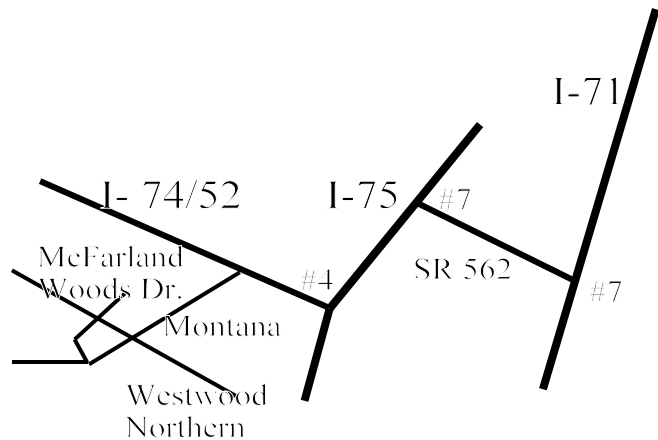
We've hiked and we've camped,

Directions:



Take I-71 toward Cincinnati. At exit 7 go west on 562 to exit 7. Take I-75 west to exit 4. Take 74/52 to the Montana/ Ford Rd. exit and take Montana SW to Westwood Northern Blvd and turn right or continue to McFarlan Rd and turn right. Take either to McFarlan Woods Dr to last parking lot. Ferry most of cars back under the 74/52 overpass to Fork Rd and leave at Logan Woods Council Site for end of trail pickup.

Trail Notes:

The trail is 10 miles long, but is strenuous and should be done in dry weather due to the number of stream crossings. Good boots and prior training are a must. Mostly off road. Excellent scenery and animal life.

"How to Catch Our Boys"

"I like to think of a man trying to get boys to come under good influence as a fisherman wishful to catch fish.

If a fisherman bait his hook with the kind Of food that he likes himself it is probable that he will not catch many-certainly not the shy, game kind of fish. He therefore uses as bait the food that the fish likes.

So with boys; if you try to preach to them what you consider elevating matter, you won't catch them. Any obvious "goody-goody" will scare away the more spirited among them, and those are the ones you want to get hold of.

The only way is to hold out something that really attracts and interests them. And I think you will find that Scouting does this. You can afterwards season it with what you want them to have."

Catch and Release

Ever Hear of Catch and Release Fishing? After you catch a fish you have an obligation to set it free - to live on, to breed and, maybe, to be caught again. You don't have to let it go, you could take it home and enjoy it.

Every Choice has a Price. Nothing is ever free. Whenever a choice is made - a course of action is chosen, or a goal is set; there is a price. When one option is selected from all the potential options, the remaining ones will no longer exist. This is not a justification to halt progress; choices have to be made and goals have to be set; frozen options are worse than none at. To choose not to choose, still is a choice.

However, when it is time for a choice to be made, it must be made in the context of the range of potential options that exist. It is necessary to look at the global results of the options. A small choice today may produce a very unacceptable range of choices when the next choice has to be made. You need to decide what you will catch and what you will release.
